Colony of Artists or Hippies?

View From Sarubbi's Window

Hippie or Artist — you've got to go. That's the message from the North Bergen township "establishment."

In fact, the township officials are considering taking legal action to remove the "hippies" who are living in rented barges at the Lord Drydock, which is opposite Bulls Ferry rd. on River rd.

The area faces Mayor Angelo Sarubbi's ultramodern construction company offices. Sarubbi is not exactly overjoyed with his new neighbors.

Officials said the influx of hippies in the area resulted when the "Village Voice" a hippie-type weekly newspaper carried an ad which offered dock site space for rent to "artists."

Townships officials have their own definition of "artists."

Some are living in rooms with a chair and a bed. Others have

installed wooden stoves which officials explain may be a "fire hazard to the area."

The land and water site is leased by the state to a Mrs. Boyer of New York City.

"I have a lease from the state that expires in October, 1970," said Mrs. Audry Boyer from her New York City real estate rental offices. "I would like to make one thing clear and that is these people we are renting dock space to are not hippies. They are artist and very famous artists."

Mrs. Boyer said she rented six sites to the swinging artist for \$50 a month.

However, the "square" officials may have the last laugh on the bearded ones.

Officials claim the lease is subject to a 30-day revocation.

"The lease states that Mrs. Boyer must rent to boats," said one officials," not broken down barges."

Sarubbi looking out his office

at the hippie colony said, "It an eyesore to the entire area. I hope we can do something about it."

Looking from Sarubbi's gigantic plush full-size windows, standing knee deep into a fur (Turn to Page 6, Column 4)
